In mid-October our Haiti mission team traveled to Gros Morne, six difficult hours out of Port au Prince, to establish our relationship with the local parish there. On November 20 we will all have the opportunity to share in their discoveries and learn more about our plan to fund a school nurse for La Resurrection School. We can each find our role in the mission to promote good health for 850 to 1000 students and their families in this extremely poor region.

On All Saints Day we came together to honor loved ones who are no longer with us. After this beautiful time of remembrance we blessed the **shoebboxes** many of us prepared for the less fortunate children around the world and those for the seafarers who come into Baltimore Harbor with no family comfort at Christmas. At the conclusion of the service we came together in fellowship to share in the **Alternative Giving Market**. Here we learned more about the ministries within our parish and some of the missions we support in the community and the world. We generously purchased tribute gifts for our family and friends that monetarily support these many ministries.

For one entire week in November our entire parish is committed to providing food and shelter for some of the homeless of the county. **SafeNights** is a major parish endeavor and a large number of us give of our time and talents to making this a comfortable home for some of our most disadvantaged citizens.

Many of us work in the **Food Pantry** and the **Thrift Shop of SMILE**. By donating a few hours every month each of us makes a significant contribution to the running of this amazing organization.

On the fourth Monday of each month a few women get together to prepare a meal for **Echo House**, the homeless shelter in Prince Frederick.

Some of us work with **Patuxent Habitat for Humanity**. Some of us work in the **Health Ministry**, organizing the **Annual South County Health Fair**.

2012 is a new year with new opportunities. Our **Appalachian Mission Team** plans a trip to aid the poor in West Virginia in late June. We will continue to support our other current missions to the best of our abilities and hopefully find new ways to share our blessings with those less fortunate.

We are seeking financial support through several sources. First, the parents of the children at La Resurrection School in Gros Morne are willing to bear some of the cost. We are also seeking the support of the Southern Maryland community and will be applying for grant support. The Outreach Committee will appreciate your financial support as well.

We are offering three ways that you can lend your support:

New from Christian Formation:



“THE BIG CONVERSATION”

Middleham and St. Peter's Parish is sponsoring "The Big Conversation" as part of its Christian Formation program. This is a new program. The concept will be to convene 2 or 3 Big Conversations annually. The objective is to provide an opportunity for both parishioners and the broader community to become informed on topics of community interest in an environment

of openness and civility. Since these are issues where there may be differing views, every effort will be made to fully represent all sides of an issue.

The Big Conversation: **The Maryland Dream Act...Vision or Nightmare**

Beginning at 3 p.m., on Sunday, January 8, 2012, Middleham and St. Peter's Episcopal Parish is hosting a panel presentation on the Maryland Dream Act followed by a half hour moderated question and answer period. The questions will be submitted by the audience. The goal of the session is to offer information about the Maryland Dream Act (both in support and opposition) in an environment of openness and civility.

The Maryland Dream Act was signed into law in May 2011. The act allows undocumented students to pay in-state tuition at community colleges and state universities if they meet certain requirements, including having graduated from a Maryland high school and attended that school for at least three years. They are also required to attend a community college first, and then transfer to a university to finish their four-year degree. Such students must prove that they or their parents paid Maryland income taxes for the three years before high school graduation, and continue to file taxes until college graduation. Opponents of the bill led a petition drive last summer to block the law from taking effect this year by collecting about 58,000 signatures to put it on the ballot in November 2012 for referendum.

The panel will be moderated by Professor Chuck Stein of St. Mary's College of Maryland, Philosophy Department.

From the Parish Health Ministry: WHOLE GRAINS ARE IMPORTANT!

A diet rich in whole grains has been linked to reduced risk of chronic diseases, including heart disease, diabetes, obesity and some cancers. Most people don't eat enough whole grains (experts recommend that adults consume at least three servings of whole grains daily). Whole grains are tasty and easy to prepare in delicious ways – including breakfast cereals, salads and side dishes.

The bulk section of natural food stores generally is well stocked with whole grains and this may be the most economical way to buy them. More and more our local chain stores carry whole grain products either in a specialty section or in the regular aisles. The germ in a whole grain contains oil that can become rancid if not stored properly. Store whole grains in a cool, dry place for up to two months, or put them in the freezer or refrigerator.

Some familiar whole grains include brown rice, barley, and cornmeal, rolled oats, whole wheat flour, whole wheat couscous and wild rice. Others you may not know include amaranth, quinoa, millet, wheat berries and bulgur. Here is a recipe.

Wheat Berry Salad

19 oz. can black beans

Half an English cucumber, diced

3 green onions chopped

1 cup of wheat berries

Small can of garbanzo beans

1 large red bell pepper seeded and diced

¼ cup dried cranberries

In a bowl, soak the wheat berries at least 4 hours or overnight in enough water to cover by an inch.

Drain. Place in saucepan with cold water to cover by 2 inches. Bring to boil, reduce heat to low and simmer, partially covered, about 1 hour or until *al dente*. Drain and cool.

In a large bowl combine cooked berries, cucumber, beans, red pepper, dried cranberries and onions. dd salt and pepper. Dress with your favorite vinaigrette dressing.

Here is my favorite dressing:

2 teaspoons honey

2 tablespoons balsamic vinegar

Shake in a jar.

2 teaspoons Dijon mustard

5 tablespoons olive oil

I double this and keep it in the fridge to use as a dip for bread (whole wheat), on salads, on steamed vegetables. *Sandra Wilkins, 410 394-3165, Parish Health Committee*
