Dear Friends,

“He’s pushing boundaries again just about at every turn” was how Sam’s mother described my grandson’s current behavior. And she was right. Sam was well beyond the “why?” question; he was moving into new territory. For a four-year-old (going on fourteen) it is always a balancing act between his desire for new adventures and his need for routine.

Earlier in September Jim Murphy from the Episcopal Church Foundation spent a weekend encouraging us to think personally and as a parish about the future and how to make thoughtful plans about our resources. The question which kept bubbling up for me was, How does Middleham and St. Peter’s Parish gracefully honor its past and joyously embrace the future?

Our ancestors, like Sam, pushed the boundaries and moved into new territory when in 1684 they built a Chapel of Ease; later the boundaries were again expanded when St. Peter’s chapel was built on Solomons Island. Each time their actions expressed a deep desire to bring the Kingdom of God near to where people were living their daily lives. Today as a parish we continue to honor the longing of our ancestors as we look to the future. The parish has a Green Committee looking at how we may all live a more eco-friendly lifestyle. The Parish Health ministry held its second Community Health Fair. Hospitality and New Comers Committee have expanded the times we gather for fellowship including neighborhood gatherings taking place this fall. Outreach continues to support local endeavors and this month a delegation from the parish is going to Haiti to explore how we might support a school nurse for La Resurrection School. Plans are underway for a second Appalachian mission trip. Christian Formation for all ages from 3 to 103 is offered on a regular basis including three youth groups, Sunday School, and weekly adult classes. Education for Ministry under the leadership of Jason Van Camp and Bill Miller has its largest first-year class in recent years.

Gracefully honoring the past compels us to joyously embrace the future. The same call of God heard by our ancestors is again speaking to us about our time and society. Stewardship is about the commitment of our entire life to the work of being a follower of Jesus. This fall I want each member of the parish to be caught in the act of stewardship. Caught in the act of making a financial pledge to the parish. Caught in the act of actively engaging in a ministry of the parish. Caught in the act of deepening - expanding their personal spiritual practices. Just as God called our ancestors to move into new territory, God is calling us to joyously embrace a future filled with new and expanding ministries.

**Haiti School Nurse Project:  
Preparing for the Trip**

During the last month, the Haiti School Nurse Project Committee has been busily preparing for the trip to La Resurrection School in Gros Morne, Haiti. This has included research into Haitian health services and nursing (see "About Haiti" in this Connector), reading informative books and information, looking into funding sources, and meeting with our St. Martin's in-the-field partners. Now the trip is just a few weeks away. The team going to Haiti includes Father David Showers, Dr. Nancy Briggs, Sandy Wilkins, RN, and Hugh and Diane Davies. All are taking the necessary medical precautions required for traveling in Haiti. On Thursday evening September 15, the team traveled to Severna Park for dinner with their guide and advisor Dan Tootle. The team received specific information about how to prepare and what to expect.

On October 13 the team will fly through Miami to Port-au-Prince, Haiti. There they will be met by the priest from La Resurrection Parish Pere Jean Lenord along with a driver and an SUV. From the airport the team will travel north along coastal Highway 1 and then northeast over the mountains to Gros Morne - a trip of 85 miles that will take 7 - 8 hours over rough roads. Over the next four days the team will meet with parish and school officials, visit the school and meet students and faculty, visit the local hospital and meet with their staff, and become familiar with life in Gros Morne. They will worship on Sunday with all of the La Resurrection parishioners. Most importantly, the team will spend the necessary time with Pere Jean Lenord working through the specifics of the plan and agreement for the provision of the nurse.

On October 17, the team will travel back to Port-au-Prince and stay overnight there before catching their flight back home on the 18th. Keep the team in your prayers as they continue with this exciting new ministry. Join the committee that will help implement the project. They include:

## **ABOUT HAITI**

Imagine what it would be like if you had to leave your country to get adequate medical care. That's what Haitian women lucky enough to live near the border with the Dominican Republic do to have their babies. Although statistics for the post-earthquake period are spotty, maternal mortality the year before the earthquake was already 5 times the regional rate with adolescents contributing to a significant proportion of the total. With the disruption of the health care system after the earthquake, the situation has probably worsened.

Babies born in Haiti are also at risk; the under 5 mortality rate is over 4 times the regional average and one third of babies are born underweight. A significant percentage of these children remain underweight for their age. While immunization levels have risen over the last 10 years, they still lag far behind the regional average. Diarrheal diseases like rotavirus, for which there is an immunization commonly used in the US are a significant cause of death in children. The Haiti Ministry of Public Health and Population recently announced a plan, supported by the Pan American Health Organization (PAHO) and international partners to increase immunization levels to 90% by 2015. Older children are also at risk. In the age group 5-14, one quarter of registered deaths were due to preventable infectious and parasitic diseases. Adolescent health suffers from a lack of knowledge and practice leading to high incidences of adolescent HIV and pregnancy. In fact, the leading cause of death in children 10-19 is HIV/AIDS and the prevalence of HIV infection in females aged 15-24 is twice that of males.

The health care system in Haiti was inadequate before the earthquake. PAHO estimates that just under two thirds of the population was reached by health services. Even the health care resources that exist are distributed mainly in the area around Port-au-Prince even though only about one fifth of the population lives in that area while two thirds live in the countryside. Oversight of training of health personnel and of professional practice are ineffective. Nursing, in particular, is poorly defined. Some of those who are called nurses are actually health care assistants, so that most of the trained nurses in Haiti are not well respected and are poorly paid.

In Haiti there are 5 schools of nursing. One, in Port-au-Prince, was demolished during the earthquake, but is in the process of being rebuilt. The Faculty of Nursing Science of the Episcopal University of Haiti located in Leogane survived the earthquake. It has a long association with the University of Michigan-based Haiti Nursing Foundation and is a 4 year Bachelor of Science program. This program is trying to improve the quality of nursing in Haiti. In the past 3 years, it has graduated 50 students, all of whom are working in Haiti.

The site of the proposed Middleham/St. Peter’s Parish school nurse project is La Resurrecion School in Gros Morne, a city located in the mountainous northern region of Haiti. Medicine for Peace is a program in the process of establishing an assistance program for Gros Morne. It addresses issues such as a safe water supply and expanding the availability of ancillary medical services by developing a hospital based clinical laboratory and radiological facility. Other projects are designed to support the health care system by developing a health monitoring system and developing a health education system. Another health care facility in Gros Morne is Alma Mater Catholic Hospital, a 50 bed facility which is the only 24-hour facility for a community of 135,000 residents.

We foresee that our project of supporting a school health nurse at La Resurrecion School will supplement the work of these agencies by providing basic school health services and monitoring to the children of the school. The school nurse’s activities should be linked to the other health care facilities in Gros Morne. We envision the nurse being active in monitoring nutrition for the children and responsible for the testing of vision and hearing of the students to maximize their ability to learn; to monitor and deliver immunizations; and to aid in the health education of the students and parents of Gros Morne. This person would also be requested to maintain documentation and submit regular reports of the activities and progress made.

We at Middleham/St. Peter’s are fortunate to enjoy access to high quality health care. With this project we can have a positive impact on the lives of the 1000 students of La Resurrecion Episcopal School and their families.

October brings us to the team trip to **Gros Morne, Haiti**. A six day trip (October 13-18) will be made by Diane and Hugh Davies, Father David, Dr. Nancy Briggs and Sandy Wilkins, RN. Relationships with the Episcopal Parish in Gros Morne will be formed and they will also assess the medical needs to accompany our commitment to provide a nurse for La Resurrection School. While this trip is self supported, the funding of a school nurse will include grant opportunities and parish fund raising. Please keep this group in your prayers as they venture to Haiti. This mission will be featured at the mini **Ministry Fair** on October 2 in the Parish Hall.



The **Shoebox Ministry** for Operation Christmas Child and the Baltimore Seafarers will kick off on October 2. Be sure to pick up a "list of suggested items needed", at your place of worship.

MSP will host **Safe Nights of Calvert County** the week of November 13 - 20 (correction from August Connector). Each night from 7 p.m. to 7 a.m., up to 20 homeless will be offered a warm, safe place to sleep along with a hot dinner and breakfast. Many folks are needed for daily cleaning, cooking, donating supplies and night monitoring.
